# Green Thumb's patch

Watering and fertilizing are two of the most important things that you can do for your yards. According to our arborist, a few points to remember in getting the most of our time, money and energy in keeping your yard beautiful.

Water in the late evenings or in the early mornings and try to avoid watering during peak sun to avoid vaporization and accelerated photosynthesis during extended sun exposures.

Aerate your yard, trees and shrubs annually to allow water and fertilizer to penetrate the soil and deeply enrich your yard. As some of us discovered this year when the clay ground we have here dries out it is almost impermeable and is very difficult to keep the water from running off. Aerating will keep the water on the roots of the plants where it is needed. (continued pg 2)

Even when our water rates go up in the summer and watering our yards becomes a more substantial economic investment keep a regular watering schedule on your trees and shrubs. Your grass may turn brown and will come back, but not watering your trees and shrubs will induce stress and could cause the tree to die. This is especially true for younger trees that don't have a deep root system developed.

# CC&Rs top 10 list

Many of the points that are brought up to the homeowners' association typically stem from people not referring to our CC&Rs which is that one inch thick document files away somewhere safe. Here is a list of top 10 points that you might want to reference to ensure that you are in code:

- 1. Boats and trailers can only be parked in the neighborhood for 72 hours.
- 2. Sheds must match your roof (shingle) and siding and must be placed out of street view.
- 3. Play structures must be placed out of street view.
- 4. Posting flyers on the mailboxes is against the rules
- 5. Cars must be parked in the garage in the evenings\*
- 6. Trash cans should not be visible from the street\*
- 7. Home additions or structural changes must be approved by the architectural committee.
- 8. House color changes must be pre-approved by the architectural committee.
- 9. Yard drainage or "French drains" must be preapproved by the architectural committee.
- 10. Fences must not be closer than eight feet from the front of your house and must be pre-approved by the architectural committee.

- · Obey all traffic and pedestrian regulations.
- · Always walk. Never run across a street.
- · Only cross the street as a group in established crosswalks (as recognized by local custom).
- · Remove any mask or item that will limit eyesight before crossing a street, driveway or alley.
- · Don't assume the right of way. Motorists may have trouble seeing trick-or-treaters.
- · Never consume food items or drinks that may be offered.
- $\cdot$  No treats are to be eaten until they are thoroughly checked by an adult at home.
- $\cdot$  Law enforcement authorities should be notified immediately of any suspicious or unlawful activity.

#### AFTER TRICK-OR-TREATING:

- · Wait until children are home to sort and check treats. Though tampering is rare, a responsible Adult should closely examine all treats and throw away any spoiled, unwrapped or suspicious items.
- · Try to apportion treats for the days following Halloween.
- · Although sharing is encouraged, make sure items that can cause choking (such as hard candies), are given only to those children of an appropriate age.

# Halloween Safety Tips

## WHEN TRICK-OR-TREATING:

A parent or responsible adult should always accompany young children on their neighborhood rounds.

### **Remind trick-or-treaters:**

- · By using a flashlight, they can see and be seen by others.
- · Stay in a group and communicate where they will be going.
- · Only go to homes with porch lights on.
- · Remain on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk.
- $\cdot$  If no sidewalk is available, walk at the farthest edge of the roadway facing traffic.
- · Never cut across yards or use alleys.
- · Never enter a stranger's home or car for a treat.
